121st Annual Report 1974-75

TO LIFE GOVERNORS AND CONTRIBUTORS:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

In the capacity of President of the Committee of Management, it gives me pleasure to present to you the 121st Annual Report and Financial Statements of the Base Hospital, Central Linen Service, Alveston and Corio for the year ended 30th June, 1975.

During the period under review the planning and deliberations of past years, to further improve hospital and health services for this community and the Corangamite Region generally, have come to fruition.

The extension of geriatric services commenced in 1973, continues to develop and expand, and greatly increased numbers of our elderly citizens are now receiving the benefits provided by the Day Hospital, Rehabilitation Ward and Domiciliary Services. To

ensure close liaison with Lyndoch in this programme of care for the aged, a sub-committee comprised of members of both committees of management meets regularly each quarter. This has proved to be a valuable and effective innovation in developing a co-ordinated and comprehensive service.

Close co-operation with Brierly Mental Hospital has resulted in the establishment of a Community Psychiatric Centre on the Base Hospital property at 26 Ryot Street, which is opposite the main hospital block. The unit will be staffed by the Mental Health Authority with Psychiatrists, Psychiatric Nurses, Social Worker and Clerical Assistants and will serve patients who previously attended the Psychiatric Outpatient Clinic at the Base Hospital.

Alterations to rooms and installation of equipment to establish the Dental Unit were duly completed and the unit was opened during October, 1974. The service has expanded rapidly and Doctor Robertson and his staff are hard pressed to keep abreast of demands.

Developments in the field of medical education have been rapid and we now have a total of ten Resident Medical Officers on the staff ranging through various posts from Intern to Registrar. The Board has sanctioned full co-operation in the Family Medicine Programme which includes the conduct of a Family Practice Clinic in the Outpatient Department and the seconding of R.M.O.'s to Private Medical Practices for training purposes.

The many hours of research and effort devoted by Matron Stewart and the nurse teachers over a long period, to the preparation of submissions, and numerous interviews with the Victorian Nursing Council, resulted in the Hospital being approved as a General Nurse Training School under the nurses (General Nursing) Regulations 1972, during November, 1974.

As you are well aware, Doctor John Reid has acted in the dual role of Pathologist and Medical Superintendent for many years. The Committee has been conscious for some time, of the heavy work load which has been shouldered so willingly and efficiently by Doctor Reid, and the decision was finally made, to appoint a Medical Superintendent, on a full time basis. Doctor P.G. Morton was selected for the post and joined the staff recently. We welcome Doctor Morton to Warrnambool and trust that he will gain reward and satisfaction from his work and associations here.

BUILDING AND MAINTENANCE.

MARCUS SALTAU HOUSE:- Unfortunately it was not possible to obtain the approval of the Hospitals and Charities Commission to continue with the final stage of renovations to this building, but persistent approaches are continuing to have this work completed. However approval has been obtained to more effectively air condition the delivery rooms and nurseries and plans and specifications are in the course of preparation. An exhaust system to ventilate the toilets, bathrooms and work areas is being installed by the Engineer at a cost of \$7,904.

REHABILITATION WARD - DAY HOSPITAL:- Extensive renovations were made to Ward 7 and the old buildings adjacent to the Infectious Diseases Ward which has greatly improved conditions for patients and enabled the geriatric programme to function more efficiently. Total cost of the work was \$44,137.

RESIDENT MEDICAL OFFICER FLATS:- The additional two flats were completed during 1974, the final cost including furniture being \$54,372.

FINANCE:

It has been a difficult task during the past year to provide sufficient funds to meet the ever increasing amounts required to pay the staff and maintain supplies. During the latter months of the financial period, it was necessary to borrow large sums from the Hospital Bankers to meet our commitments. However during June and July funds were made available by the State Treasury to greatly reduce our obligations in this regard. Final figures for the period 1st July, 1974 to 30th June, 1975 were as follows:-

These figures include provisions made for Long Service Leave entitlements and patients fees which may not be collected. A Commonwealth Grant of approximately \$120,000 for the Day Hospital is still outstanding. With regard to the future it should be mentioned that with the introduction of the Medibank (Hospital) scheme on August 1st, 1975, a greatly increased flow of funds from Government sources will be required to replace the fees which have previously been paid by patients.

STATISTICS:

The role of the Hospital is gradually changing with greater accent being placed on Day and Domiciliary Care particularly for the higher age groups. This is having the effect of reducing the number of patients in hospital which is demonstrated by the following figures which show a reduction of 10.0 in the daily average of inpatients, accommodated during the past year.

CHARITABLE FUND:

Our Auxiliary members in the country districts, and in Warrnambool, continue to maintain their loyal support, and conducted many and varied fund raising activities throughout the year, to assist the Board in meeting the community contribution required for building projects and equipment purchases. A total of \$11,643 was received from this source. The 3YB Radio Appeal was again conducted during the month of June with the usual generous response from the public. All donations received throughout the year and on the appeal day, by the various hospitals in the Corangamite region were acknowledged and accumulated to publicize this aspect of Hospital financing. The total amount announced for all hospitals was \$74,791 of which our own institutions shared as follows:-

District Schools co-operated in the Egg Appeal conducted during September-October 1974 and we express appreciation to the teachers and pupils who collected and supplied 482 dozen eggs for use in the hospital kitchen.

Particular mention is made of the wonderful response from the Red Cross Society which voluntarily staff the Hospital Departments during a period of industrial unrest. Red Cross Members were assisted by volunteers from the Country Womens Association, Past Trainees Association, Fifth Form Students of the North Warrnambool Technical School and many others on an individual basis, in all a total of 50 persons.

HONORARY SERVICES:

The traditional system of providing medical and other professional services for public patients on an honorary basis was maintained during the year and appreciation is expressed to the Doctors, Dentists and Optometrists who maintained this service.

Under the Medibank Scheme the HONORARY SYSTEM WILL BE DISCONTINUED AS ALL PATIENTS WHO SO CHOOSE WILL BE TREATED FREE OF CHARGE AND Doctors are to be paid for hospital work.

Our Solicitors, Messrs. Mackay, Taylor & Smith continue to give advice on legal matters in an honorary capacity and their assistance is acknowledged with thanks.

REGIONAL AND SECTOR SCHEMES:

Periodic meetings of Sector Board No. 5. and the Corangamite Regional Council have been well attended and the discussions and programmes arranged have stimulated member hospitals to view their activities in a wider context than the local sphere. The outcome of the inquiry into Hospital and Health Services in Victoria is awaited before any further proposals on a regional and sector basis are considered.

PUBLIC RELATIONS:

A perusal of monthly reports submitted by Matron Stewart indicate that many groups of school children and other interested persons are allowed to tour the various hospital departments under the guidance of a staff member. The tours encourage good public relations and are particularly helpful in recruiting staff. It is planned to conduct an "Open Day" during August, to allow members of the public to view the Day Hospital and Rehabilitation Ward.

HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES COMMISSION:

Our thanks is recorded to the Chairman, Doctor E. Wilder, his fellow commissioners and departmental officers for the co-operation and assistance which the Board has received when negotiations with the Commission have been necessary. All requests for approvals to purchase equipment and other proposals brought forward have received careful and sympathetic consideration.

ALVESTON AND CORIO NURSING HOMES:

Although the Geriatric programme has greatly expanded services for Day and Domiciliary Care of the elderly, there still remains a large number who must be admitted for institutional care on a long term basis. The eighty beds at Alveston and Corio continue to be used to capacity for this purpose and Matron Bruce and Matron Hammond and their staff members are to be commended for the high standards which they maintain in this demanding task. The compassionate and sympathetic manner in which they carry out their duties conform in full measure to the highest ideals of the nursing profession.

A Hi-Lo Bed and Adjustable Overbed Table is now provided for every patient in the home. This equipment greatly improves the efficiency of the nurses and adds to the comfort of the patient.

To provide more privacy in the wards at Alveston, it is planned to erect overhead bed curtain tracks in order that each bed may be screened off when required. The tracks are in hand and will be erected in the near future.

An Open Day was conducted at Corio on July 2nd to celebrate the 20th Anniversary of its opening as a nursing home. Matron Hammond is to be congratulated on the success of this function and the Board is appreciative to all the groups who attended to provide entertainment and fellowship for the benefit of patients.

ADMINISTRATION:

The measure of the Hospitals effectiveness and efficiency is the quality of care which each individual receives during the course of treatment, whether it be as an inpatient or an outpatient. The standard attained depends almost entirely on the performance of the medical, medical ancillary and nursing units and the manner in which they are supported by the general service departments. To achieve success it is essential that goodwill and co-operation is maintained throughout the organization and that communications flow freely between all sections. The Medical Superintendent, Doctor Reid, Matron - Miss Stewart and Manager - Mr. Matthews are conscious of the importance of this aspect and strive continuously to foster and preserve these principles, both at managerial level and throughout the departments.

DEPARTMENTAL STAFF:

Further expansion has taken place in the Medical Ancillary areas. Occupational Therapist, Miss J. Gude and Dietitian, Miss P. Knight commenced these new ventures at the beginning of 1975 to further widen and improve our field of service. The problem of heavy work load in the pharmacy has been overcome and the department is now fully staffed with Mr. Gregory Weeks as Chief Pharmacist, and Mr. Charles Whiddett and Miss Daphne Soh as Pharmacists. Five bursaries were granted to students in various disciplines to ensure future continuity of staffing of Medical Ancillary Units.

The Nursing Division ably directed by Miss Stewart and her deputies, Miss Taylor and Miss Hawker, continue to care for the patients with efficiency tempered with warmth and understanding. The resignation of Miss Rogan, Principal and Miss Salomons, Deputy Principal have created difficulties in the School of Nursing. Negotiations are at present taking place with a highly recommended applicant in the United Kingdom for the position of Principal Nurse Teacher, which are expected to be successfully concluded in the near future.

We have become accustomed to high standards of performance and full co-operation from the general services and we recognize the abilities and efforts of the following Departmental Heads and their staff members:-

Mr. R. Earl - Central Linen Services Manager.
Mrs. J. Horwood - Domestic Supervisor.
Mr. F. Kelly - Catering Manager.

A policy of co-operation with Government Employment Schemes has been adopted. School students have been employed throughout 1975 in various service departments for work experience and a total of eight additional apprentices, covering all trades at the hospital, are to be engaged.

Control and direction of hospital affairs and the execution of Board of Management policies have been carried out in a capable manner by the Manager, Mr. Matthews and Assistant Manager, Mr. Hando.

Office functions and accounting requirements have been administered and supervised in a satisfactory manner by the Accountant, Mr. W. Vaughan. He is to be commended for his efforts in commissioning the Computer Terminal and training the operators in its use.

Members of the office staff have been most co-operative in working additional shifts to overcome difficulties associated with accounting machine breakdowns and peak work load requirements.

CONCLUSION:

With the introduction of the new system and hospital financing on 1st August, 1975, under the State-Commonwealth Hospital Cost Sharing Agreement, many traditional procedures and philosophies will change. We understand that the report of the inquiry into Hospital and Health Services in Victoria has been lodged with the Minister for Health and expect that the report will generate further alterations in the organization and

administration of our Health Services. We are confident however, that the Committee of Management and the staff will adapt quickly to the changes and that patients will continue to receive the same standard of care and attention as in the past.

I wish to record appreciation to my fellow Board Members for their co-operation and support throughout the year. Meetings of the Board and the Sub-Committees have been well attended and all have given generously of their time and talents to deliberate and fix policies for the conduct of the wide range of hospital activities.

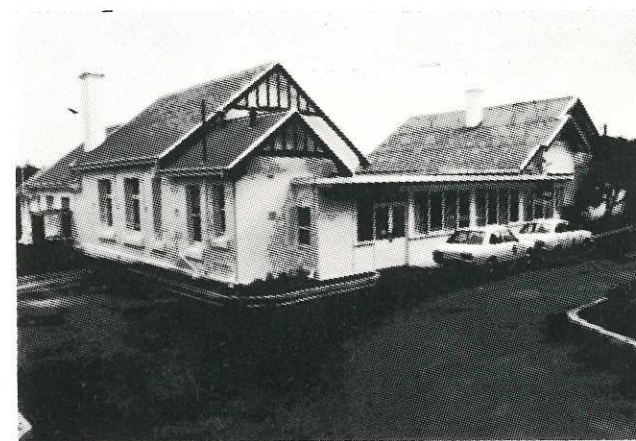

APPRECIATION.

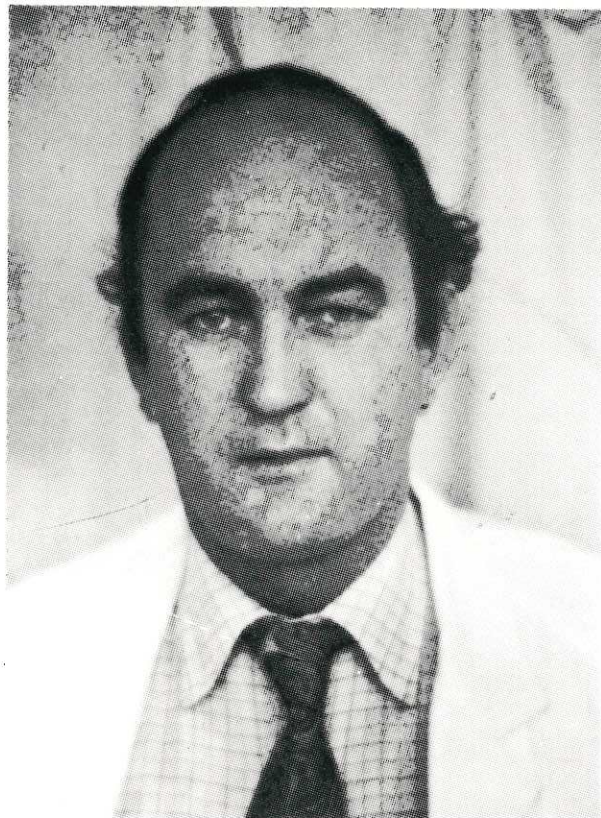

Medical Superintendent's Report

The past year has been busy, though there has been some fluctuation in the day to day bed occupancy in some wards. All members of the staff have performed their duties in the high standard that we take for granted.

One of the major new developments was the alteration of Ward 7 and the completion of the Day Hospital. While in this unit the convalescent, elderly sick will be assessed and rehabilitated. By the end of three months the experts will decide whether the patient is fit to go home, be treated by their own Doctor with the assistance of the visiting nurse, or whether the patient should go home and continue to visit the Day Hospital. The more complicated cases will be referred to Homes for the Aged and Infirmaries but will be kept under observation by the Specialists and receive all the paramedical treatment given by Physiotherapists, Occupational Therapists, Speech Therapists etc., This is a fairly new innovation in this region and is still looked upon with some suspicion, but I consider that it is one of the major projects that has taken place and I would like all concerned to co-operate with its development.

The general public should realise that the new Ward

7 is nothing like the old Ward 7 which was not popular. The function of this unit is to get the patients early enough to rehabilitate them and get them back into their own homes and into the community.

The advances in medical knowledge and treatment is advancing rapidly and it is no longer possible to accept the old standards of medical care as being adequate. In the not too distant future all hospitals will be "accredited". This means that all sections of the hospital will be inspected and the standard of work scrutinised by experts in their own fields. Already, Warrnambool Base Hospital has reached the standards which will be acceptable in most areas. We are well staffed, well equipped and there is a high standard in professional pride which is justifiable.

Our library is very well stocked and used actively by all members of the hospital staff.

Teaching is one of the main stimuli for improving one's own knowledge.

This year we had four first year RMO's (interns) and four Senior RMO's (Junior RMO's). The Committee of Graduate Studies met from time to time to consider the progress of the interns, Dr. Sobey, Clinical Supervisor, made sure that they were getting adequate clinical experience. All the Junior RMO's enrolled in the Family Medicine Programme.

This programme is designed to train young Doctors to become General Practitioners, and Warrnambool Base Hospital was chosen as a pilot scheme hospital.

This has developed very well. General Practitioners from Warrnambool and from the district run the Outpatient Clinic, morning and afternoon sessions. When the sign 'Family Medicine

Programme' is up on the board, it is indicative that that part of the Outpatient Department, temporarily, is not part of the Hospital, but is part of the General Practice of the Doctor who is in session. The junior RMO's working with him on that day are regarded as part of his Group Practice. Three months of the year the junior RMO spends three months out in General Practice where they gain valuable experience in the continued treatment of the General Practitioner type of patient. The fact that young Doctors are out of the hospital for such a long time and that new 'leave' regulations give them much longer holidays has brought about a decision to increase the junior staff to five interns and five junior RMO's next year.

Over the past years we have had a loose working arrangement with Prince Henry's Hospital in Melbourne. Once a quarter, two of the Specialists come to Warrnambool and spend a day discussing cases and giving short talks in their specialities.

This year they have started to send a Surgical Registrar every three months to Warrnambool, this has been an advantage to us as well as to the Doctor from the city. The Professor of Medicine has approached us with a suggestion that next year, we have also, a rotating Medical Registrar. This may seem to be an excessive amount of Doctors in Warrnambool. In the early days we had two RMO's.

Now we are talking in terms of ten RMO's plus two Registrars. But with all the new regulations and with more detailed specialities, it is important to spread out the work more, and it is important that the young Doctors have more time to study.

The suggested hospital side of 'Medibank' gave rise to qualms amongst the local General Practitioners.

All General Practitioners have had access to their own public patients in the hospital and had full control of the medical supervision and treatment of his patient. There was a suggestion that under the hospital side of 'Medibank' he would no longer have this privilege. We in Warrnambool, felt that the present situation was good and should not be disturbed. We are hopeful that some scheme will be developed, whereby the General Practitioner will still have access to the standard patient in hospital and be fully responsible for his treatment.

With the increase in medical staff and with the increased administrative duties arising from 'Medibank' etc., it was important that a hospital of Warrnambool's size should have a full time Medical Superintendent. We needed someone with good clinical knowledge and also administrative knowledge. We were most fortunate to acquire the services of Dr. Peter Morton who was Senior Medical Officer at Woomera, S.A. Dr. Morton is completing his administrative course. We welcome him, and I hope that all will give him full assistance. The job of Medical Superintendent is not an enviable one.

In Warrnambool we have an excellent team of Physicians, Surgeons, Specialists and Paramedicals who work extremely well together to the benefit of the patient. Sometimes we take our own experts for granted and tend to overlook what expert teams we have.

We are most fortunate in the standard of all members of the staff. The Paramedical Departments will be issuing their own reports and this will give the community some idea of the volume of work that

goes on behind the scenes. I would particularly like to mention the acquisition of the Occupational Therapists and Dietitian. These are new ventures and are proving satisfactory.

A fairly high percentage of our Inpatients and Outpatients attend for some psychiatric problem and we appreciate the co-operation of the Specialists from Brierly Hospital. They have run an Outpatient Department within the hospital grounds, but we have now acquired a building across the road from the hospital. This has been renovated and made to look most attractive, and will act as the Psychiatric Outpatient Clinic. Dr. Wells Hannah, Medical Superintendent, retired towards the end of the year.

Dr. Hannah was a quiet, unassuming man, but a good psychiatrist who co-operated very well. We wish him well in his retirement.

The nurses are the backbone of the hospital and it is most gratifying that their professional status has at last been recognised. The nurses have continued to give excellent service under the supervision of Miss Stewart, Matron. The School of Nursing continued to have high pass rates, and indeed a high standard of teaching. It was with regret that we learnt that Miss Rogan, Nursing Educator, was leaving to take up a post in Brisbane. Miss Rogan has been responsible for raising the school of nursing to its present very high standard and I would like to thank her for her past services.

Running a hospital is a big business. We are most fortunate in the administrative staff which maintain a good, efficient service at all times. All members of the hospital staff have reason to be thankful for an efficient administration because it makes life so much more peaceful. Mr. Mathews is to be congratulated.

It was in 1966 that I was asked if I would add the duties of Medical Superintendent to my job as Pathologist. It was with some hesitation that I did so, as I had no special qualifications in administration. However, as I felt that a Medical Superintendent was essential at that time, within the hospital, I accepted. It certainly increased the workload, particularly as the years went by, but I would like to thank all those who co-operated with me during that period of time. Looking back on innovations, the two which pleased me most were:- (1) The computerisation of the minimum basic data of the clinical record through the Monash Computer Group. We are probably the only hospital in Victoria which can produce this data for all admissions, whether private, intermediate or public, from January 1966 to the present date.

As we were already using the computer it was a simple process to transfer our salaries and accounts to the computer, and this has been a great move to the administration. We have recently acquired one of the most modern terminals in Victoria.

(2) The drug prescription and the drug administration sheet. This was a fairly new concept and has still not been fully accepted by all Doctors, but is being introduced into most hospitals in some form or another. I consider that it must reduce the numbers of errors in drug administration, which were higher than realised, in all parts of the world. As I said earlier, I welcome the appointment of Dr. Morton and sincerely hope that he will enjoy his stay in Warrnambool.

BIOCHEMISTRY - 12,207 specimens were received. The biochemistry department has expanded tremendously over the years and is now capable of doing more sophisticated tests. Apart from simple routine tests it performs - Blood gases, Lithiums, Thyroid function tests, etc., A new Gamma counter is being tested and if this proves satisfactory and is purchased it will enable the Biochemist to perform very sophisticated tests and there will be very little that we shall have to send to Melbourne for analysis.

We take part in the quality control of the College of Pathologists and of Wellcome in London. This control gives us great confidence in the biochemical results, which continue to be satisfactory.

MICROBIOLOGY - has been very busy and received 10,045 specimens. The introduction of the API system for the identification of the coliform bacilli and for anaerobes has been a great advance.

HAEMATOLOGY - 10,620 specimens were received. Without the aid of mechanical counters such as the Coulter counter we would not have been able to cope with the volume of work. A new mechanical counter called the Celloscope is under test. This is most sophisticated and performs a number of tests automatically.

SEROLOGY - Serological tests numbered 8,278. We are able to screen for most diseases. Some serum is sent to Fairfield Hospital for analysis.

HISTOLOGY - 1,651 specimens were received. There is no spectacular change in the Histology section. Quite a number of frozen sections are requested throughout the year.

BLOOD BANK - Number of Blood Donors was 1,521.

Number of Cross Matches was 793.

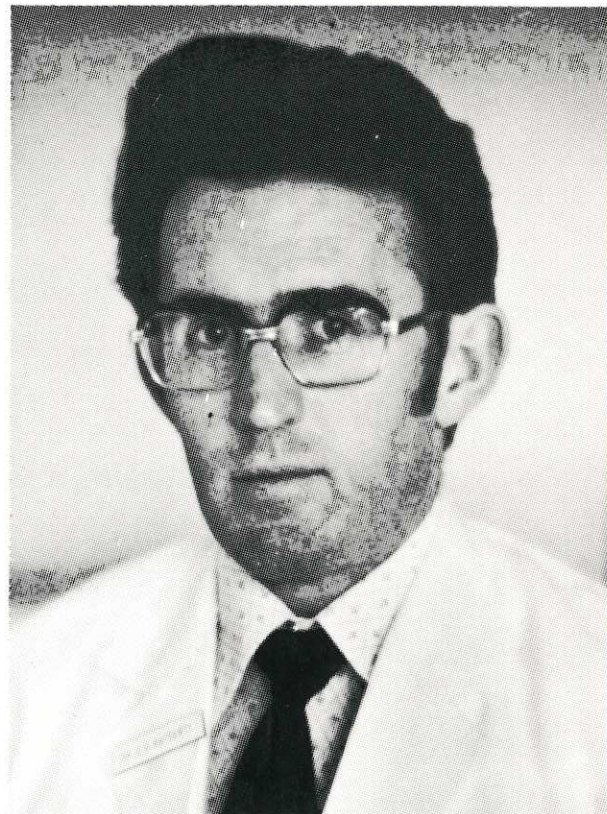

The blood bank is kept busy and I would like to acknowledge the voluntary help of the past trainees and the St. Johns Ambulance. With the introduction of injections of Anti-D in special cases, the incidence of 'Rhesus' babies has been greatly reduced.

Like all other Departments, the Pathology Department is cramped for space. Plans will need to be drawn up for rooms for the Pathologist, his Secretary, extensions to the working rooms, and waiting rooms for patients.

Radiologist's Report

Demand for Radiology Services continues to climb at a steady rate. For Special Investigations we are always booked ahead for at least a week and for these examinations we have almost reached saturation point for the number of examinations we can carry out, in the available time, with our present apparatus and staff.

This will be rectified to some extent by the installation of "a rapid sequencing 70mm. camera attachment," to our Xray Intensifier and T.V. system. This apparatus, the purchase of which has been approved, will add considerably to the efficiency of our system.

We are also in the early stages of planning the use of the space which will be vacated by Physiotherapy when alternative accommodation becomes available.

As part of Mr. Fisher's Regional Surgeon's upgrading program in Indonesia, which receives some financial assistance from the Federal Government, Mr. Ziegeler has recently used part of his Long-

Service-Leave in two trips to the hospital at Padang, Sumatra. This was to instal an Xray unit and assist in the general improvement of the local Radiography.

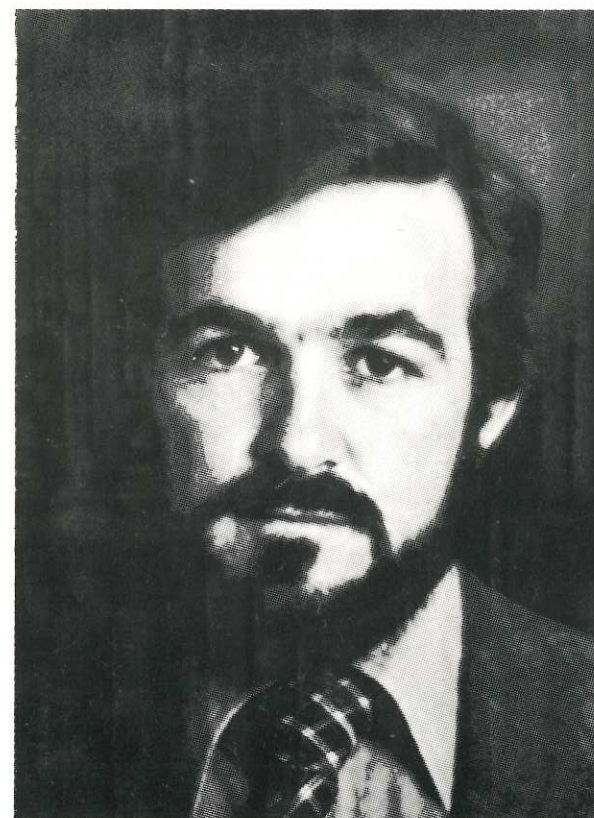

She resigned to take up a post as Tutor Radiographer at the Prince Henry's Hospital. Her place was taken by Miss Margaret Stewart, qualified Radiographer, who was trained at Hamilton Base Hospital. We have also started a new Trainee in 1975, Miss Marilyn Brown from Coleraine.

My staff and myself look forward to providing continued Diagnostic Service in the 1975-6 period.

Geriatrician's Report

Still in the embryo stage and seeking greater recognition and appreciation 1974 -1975 was nevertheless a significant year in the development of the Day Hospital-Geriatric Unit. Three events occurred in the latter part of the year which will probably to a large degree shape the immediate future. These were Dr. J.F. O'Callaghan's joining the unit and bringing a great deal of experience to the unit; in addition Warrnambool was extremely fortunate in acquiring the services of Miss J. Gude the first trained occupational therapist to work in the area and thirdly a reshuffling of staff saw Miss J. Hill appointed as director of paramedical services.

In fact there were many occurrences during the year all going to shape the development of the unit. The two buildings housing the day unit received the renovator's final touch allowing the unit sufficient room to work. The extra space allowed facilities to be built for Mrs. Quigley, again the first chiropodist to be employed by the hospital, whose service is invaluable and who has been inundated since the first day she joined the unit. The extra space also allowed Mrs. Taylor, the welfare officer to join the unit allowing the various people in the unit to help her in her work rather than the reverse.

These people have joined others who have been present since the Day Hospital's inception and without whose enthusiasm and perseverance it would not have continued; of these particular mention needs to be made of Sr. M. Owen and Miss R. McKinney.

In all there were 374 people treated in the six months beginning January 1975 representing some 20,000 attendances with a daily average of 16 people. In addition there were 374 people seen in the social welfare department and some 1,300 people received chiropody attention.

Finally the last thing worthy of mention is the degree of rapport that has developed between the Day Unit and Lyndoch. More and more there is a coming and going of people between the two units with Lyndoch making rehabilitation hospital and hostel beds available to people requiring rehabilitation in the unit who would also perhaps be better away from the formal hospital environment. In addition the two units have combined to institute a Day Centre at Lyndoch to provide a social atmosphere to supplement the therapeutic activities of the Day Hospital. In all 1974-1975 has been an eventful year in the development of the unit.
